Whereas James M<sup>r</sup> Renolds of Laporte County, Indiana

has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Laporte

whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said James M<sup>r</sup> Renolds

according to the provisions of the Act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for the East half of the South East quarter, of Section twenty eight, in Township thirty four North, of Range five West, in the District of Lands subject to sale at Laporte Indiana containing Eighty Acres

according to the official plat of the survey of the said Lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been purchased by the said James M<sup>r</sup> Renolds

**NOW KNOW YE**, That the **UNITED STATES OF AMERICA**, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have given and granted, and by these presents do give and grant, unto the said James M<sup>r</sup> Renolds

and to his heirs, the said tract above described:

To have and to hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities and appurtenances of whatsoever nature, thereto belonging, unto the said James M<sup>r</sup> Renolds and to his heirs and assigns forever.
